Why the paper is being presented

The paper is presented to provide an update on activities since the last meeting of the Board.

Report

Top issues

Financial sustainability: we are continuing to work on plans to increase income streams through fundraising and commercial activity, however the back drop of domestic economic instability (Brexit, cost of living crisis, financial markets) is making this more complex and challenging.

We have started discussions with partners and will continue this process in the new year with a view to developing a new business plan for the start of the new year 2022/24.

We will also develop a case for more central government funding in order to put ReLondon on a more financially sustainable pathway.

Staffing

Since the last meeting of the Board (12 October 2022) the following staff changes have taken place.

• Senior Business Advisor, Business Transformation Team, Business & Sector Support (November)

Starters

• Campaign lead (food), communications and behaviour change (November)

Recruitment

Recruitment for a Senior Business Advisor (food lead) in the Business Transformation Team is underway.

- C40 Cities World Mayors' Summit 19th October 2022 Wayne Hubbard attended and spoke as a panellist about insights and innovations to address the climate crisis.
- UKRI Circular Economy research hub 20th October 2022 Pauline Metivier presented at this webinar on planning and adopting circular economy practices.
- **The London Conference** 1st November 2022 ReLondon co-sponsored and attended as an exhibitor.
- London Build 16th November 2022 the CIRCuIT team ran an exhibition stand over the two days of this major construction industry event at Olympia and hosted a panel on 'Future-proofing London: applying the circular economy through flexible design'.
- Festival of Circular Economy (CIWM) 28th 30th November Wayne Hubbard, Antony Buchan, Andrea Charlson, Lamia Sbiti and Ali Moore will be presenting or participating as panellists on various topics over the course of the event.

<u>Awards:</u>

ReLondon won the following category at the National Recycling Awards on 6th December:

• **Partnership Excellence (public/private sector)** – for the flats recycling project

London also won the Milan Pact Award for its city-wide food waste reduction initiatives; this was collected in-person on behalf of the Mayor by Wayne Hubbard in Buenos Aires on 17th October.

Project Dashboard Commentary

Detailed updates on programmes are included in paper 3. The project dashboard is attached at Appendix 1. Commentary below details project changes highlighted on the dashboard.

The rating for the Circular Economy Outcome Fund has changed from green to red. It has been a year in which we have been trying to secure anchor funding with local authorities and philanthropic organisations to progress this project without success. In

parallel, we have seen a growing interest in traditional grant schemes to support circular economy innovators. We are therefore proposing to stop actively looking for such anchor funding for a Circular Economy Outcome Fund but keep all the technical knowledge we have built so far on this financing mechanism to be able to reuse it if we see a rising interest from potential funders in the future.

The assessment of 'Commercial marketing' has changed from amber to green, as plans and activities are now in place to start generating leads. However the commercial strategy is currently undergoing some changes, so as a result the marketing communications plan is very tactical and short-term, designed to 'test and learn'. The corporate communications team is now working closely with the commercial manager to build a longer term plan for 2023-24.

The rating for the podcast has changed from green to amber as we are currently only on target to produce 5 episodes before the end of the financial year. This is due to the time it took to recruit a new producer; and a lack of response from potential interviewees. More research and outreach is now needed to get us back on track and deliver more regular episodes.

The assessment for Repair Week 2023 has changed from grey to green as work has started on delivery for March 2023.

The Love Not Landfill (core) rating has changed from green to amber as reductions in internal resources mean that it is effectively deprioritised; however a new pop-up shop is targeted for January, and resourcing will need to be moved from other campaigns to provide the support needed to deliver it well.

'Commercial Waste Data' – the assessment for this project has changed from red to grey. As previously reported, this project was dependent on match funding being secured which we have been unable to secure. Defra confirmed that it will not be considering commercial waste data as part of its current data project. The assessment for this project has therefore been changed from red to grey as it will not be progressed this financial year.

The Flats Above Shops (FLASH) project has been added to the dashboard to reflect the work that is being delivered by the Local Authority Support Team. Details are included in the Programme Updates report.

Audit Committee Activity

The Committee has not met formally since the last full Board meeting on 12 October. A meeting had been scheduled for 1 December, but was unable to take place as there were insufficient members present to form a quorum.



Income

Most income lines are behind budget at end Q2 in the summary accounts due to a lag in invoicing for work that has been contracted, however the table below shows income at end October which has been secured but has not have been received or invoiced for yet.

In addition £24lk has been released into the P&L from a deferred income fund.

Currently amendments to the year end projection include:

Reduction of funds released to P&L for Green New Deal by $\pm 32k$ – expenditure has been reduced to match this, so no significant impact on the bottom line.

Increased 'other income' projections to £320k to reflect £24lk of funds released to the P&L from a deferred income account and c£60k of bank interest.

Forecasting a reduction in return on investments by $\pounds 253k$, as plans for an exit in the Circularity Capital fund have been postponed.

Income projection for the year is currently £33k ahead of budget.

Programme Expenditure

Expenditure budgets have been profiled based on expected timing of activity rather than spread equally over the year. As such the costs for the year to date (end Q2) are broadly in line with expectation, with a few points of note:

Local Authority Support: c£28k or 7% behind budget, of which c£20k is a result of new team members taking up posts later than budgeted for and as such is not expected to 'catch up'. The remaining £8k is made up of low level overs and unders on direct costs across all projects.

Business sector & support core activity: overall expenditure is c£10k behind budget, which is made up of £24k actual savings on circular economy week, whilst staffing was over budget in QI but is expected to level off over the year. Currently expenditure is forecasted to be 24k below budget at year end.

Business sector restricted grant projects: expenditure is 16% behind budget, specific points to note

Final expenditure for the Green New Deal programme has been reduced by £32k to reflect the amount of funding available (see above).

The majority of the rest of the underspend is direct expenditure through costs which will have no significant impact on ReLondon.

Communications: Staffing expenditure is on track and expenditure slightly behind as invoices for the insights work for the pan London food campaign had not been received.

Central costs: Expenditure lines are broadly in line with budget, with the exceptions of training costs and professional fees. Training costs are underspent as a result of kicking off the development programme in Q3 rather than Q2 (£17k underspent) and will catch up over remainder of the year.

Professional fees are ahead of budget at this point in the year as a result of front loading consultants, but this is expected to balance out over the year

Expenditure forecast for the year is currently £85k below budget.

We retain a full year budget projection of $\pm 2m$ investment liabilities, but these may not all be drawn in this financial year.

Projected year end out turn.

Currently projecting a net programme spend of \pounds 2.25m against a budget of \pounds 2.34m and with investment commitments a total net spend of \pounds 4.25m.

Some issues around the treatment of deferred income have been identified which has led us to plan a non-cash adjustment to the balance by $-\pounds600k$. This clearly affects our projected year end balance and we are taking active steps to minimize the impact on the business and maximise the YE balance.
